



In 1933, during the Great Depression, HABS (Historic American Buildings Survey), the Federal Government's oldest preservation program, was established to document and record the most significant structures in the United States -

Followed in 1969, by HAER (Historic American Engineering Record), Documentation produced through these programs constitutes the nation's largest archive of historic architectural, engineering documentation.





"HALS is the official National Park Service/Library of Congress academic record of historically significant American landscapes."

In 2000, working with the National Park Service, American Society of Landscape Architects and the Library Congress, HALS (Historic American Landscapes Survey) was established to recognize the most historically significant landscapes of the country -

HALS has documented sites such as Mount Vernon, Camp Curry at Yosemite and Dumbarton Oaks in WDC.

The HABS/HAER/HALS collections are among the largest and heavily used by the American public in the Prints and Photographs Division of the Library of Congress. HALS builds on the HABS and HAER documentation traditions, while expanding the range of stories that can be told about human relationships with the land. HALS documents the dynamics of landscapes, as HABS and HAER have documented unique building and engineering structures and systems." Since this program has gone online, it is also one of the most popularly searched collections at the Library of Congress.

# <u>Alison</u>

Historic landscapes are special places. They are important touchstones of national, regional, and local identity. They foster a sense of community and place. Historic landscapes are also fragile places. They are affected by the forces of nature, and by commercial and residential development, vandalism and neglect. They undergo changes that are often unpredictable and irreversible. For these reasons and for the benefit of future generations, it is important to document these places.


# Laguna Beach Meets all 4 Criteria for Significance

- 1. Is the landscape associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history?
- 2. Is the landscape associated with the lives of significant persons of our past?
- 3. Does the landscape embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or represent the work of a master, or possess high artistic values, or represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction?
- 4. Has the landscape yielded or may be likely to yield, information important in history or prehistory?



Its geological formations, natural vegetation, and coastal location attracted artists beginning around the turn of the last century.





The artistic influence and the character of the landscape shaped a unique community.





Laguna's history, including isolation from other development, its role as art colony, and its leadership in environmental preservation all stem from the characteristics and disposition of the landscape itself.







It was excluded from the ranchos that were granted in the 1800s ...





Here is a map of the 39 homesteads that were filed in Laguna Beach. The rectangular/ north/ south outlines of the claims overlaying our very undulating topography were very influential in determining the layout of the streets and lots in our city—parcel by parcel. Not a master plan.


The homesteaders planted groves of Eucalyptus to establish their claims. This proved to be a distinctive element in our landscape and one that was a favorite subject of the plein air painters -



The plein air painters helped spread the word about the beauty of Laguna, and residents took every opportunity to preserve and enhance it from the very beginning. In January 1925, the Woman's Club launched a campaign to make Laguna Beach "the Paradise of the Pacific," distributing 700 trees for planting on Arbor Day.


In 1931 even the sewage treatment building, was publicized as being "ATTRACTIVE IN DESIGN."


In 1940 the city's first land use plan included restrictions on building size, and its 1959 General Plan called for "keeping residential and commercial development in the central area low."

In 1971 with the threat of high-rise construction along the coast, 80% of Laguna voters approved a 36' height limit


Then as development pressures intensified, the city worked on other ways to preserve its character, including preserving heritage trees and a buildings, design review (1972) and the Downtown Specific Plan (1989) to protect the downtown's small scale and the variety of shops and services.

Laguna's landscape, with its enclosed downtown where residents often meet face-to-face, has contributed to a sense of community that is reflected in a long list of homegrown community organizations working on social needs, art and the environment. These are the links between landscape and community that the Historic American Landscapes Survey records and celebrates.



Jim Dilley, local bookstore owner had visited England and was impressed with their greenbelt planning. In 1968 the Irvine and Moulton Ranches were still grazing cows and most of Orange County development seemed safely far away Dilley realized that if we didn't preserve open space around our city now Laguna Beach would be enveloped by urbanization.








